Message from you local Inspector, Ed Brown

I hope everyone had a peaceful New Year. Our officers were deployed throughout the festive season continuing to provide a 24 hour emergency response service as well as demonstrating the best of community policing. One of our policing priorities identified for the town relates to ongoing damage being reported at the public toilets in the town and we have had a further incident reported this month. Police patrols will target this area but generally we have seen an improvement. There have also been issues of Wildlife Crime at Holt Country Park particularly related to dogs being allowed to chase deer. This is an offence and we would remind people that dogs must be kept under proper control. We are running Special Constabulary recruitment events over the next few months so if you are interested in helping out locally then this could be an opportunity for you. In a rural area it is always important to be vigilant and to report activity which doesn't feel right.

Crime Updates (1st to 31st December 2019)

Offence	Numbers	What could this entail
Arson	0	Damage caused as a result of fire.
Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)	2	Harassment, alarm or distress is caused in a non-crime incident.
Burglary - Residential	4	Entry and theft to any building within the curtilage/boundary of a residence.
Burglary - Business and Community	1	Entry and theft to any building or structure not within the curtilage/ boundary of a residence.
Criminal Damage	1	A person destroys or damages property belonging to someone else.
Domestic	3	Domestic incidents where a crime has not occurred. Parties are aged 16 or over and have been intimate partners or family members regardless of sexuality.
Hate Incident	0	Any incident where a crime has not occurred which the victim, or anyone else, thinks is based on someone's prejudice towards them because of their race, religion, sexual orientation, disability or because they are transgender.
Race or Religious aggravated public fear	0	Any crime determined to have a hate element as per above.
Possession of controlled substance	0	Unlawful possession of a drug classified in class A, B or C.
Possession of weapons	0	Unlawful possession of an article used as a weapon.
Public fear, alarm or distress	4	Public order offences e.g. from a verbal altercation to offences just short of violence.
Robbery	0	Includes a range of offences where force is used, threatened or the victim is put in fear.
Theft from a motor vehicle	0	Any item stolen that was in, on or attached to a motor vehicle.
Theft or unauthorised taking of a motor vehicle	2	Any motor vehicle including those abandoned.
Theft of pedal cycle	0	From a public place, if stolen from a shed or garage this would be a Burglary Residential.
Theft from a person	0	Purse being taken from a handbag, or a mobile phone from a shopping basket.

Our drones have become a vital resource to the Constabulary, and since their introduction in 2017 have been involved in searching, locating and saving the lives of a significant number of people. With the introduction of our latest drones, we now have the capability to deploy in all weather conditions, day or night. The drone allows us to search large areas, quickly and efficiently and environments that would ordinarily be too dangerous, such as rivers, wetlands, or demolition sites. Here in North Norfolk two of our Beat Managers are now being trained as Drone Pilots this will also allow us to deploy the drones to assist with local policing priorities such as Marine Crime.
